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The founder of *Universalist Humanism* and the inspiration behind the *World March for Peace* and *Nonviolence* spoke of the possibility of constructing a Universal Human Nation in the 10th Summit of Nobel Peace Laureates.

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"A march is crossing the world."

"It's the March for Peace and Nonviolence." This was the beginning of *Silo*'s speech in the 10th Summit of Nobel Peace Laureates, where he spoke as founder of Universalist Humanism and the inspiration behind the World March.

He explained that the March was launched one year ago "with the clear intention of creating awareness of the dangerous global situation in which we are living", that "is not the sum of individual crises, but rather a picture that reveals the global failure of a system whose method of action is violence and whose central value is money."

He then said that we are considerably behind when it comes to concern over the issue of violence, compared with other issues such as the defense of the environment and the ecology. "The defense of human life and the most basic human rights have not yet taken root at a global and general level. It seems we are still apologists for violence when it comes to arguing that it is for defense, or even "preventive defense," against possible aggression. And even massive destruction of defenseless populations doesn't seem to horrify us. Only when violence touches us in our civic life through violent crimes do we become alarmed, but we still do not stop glorifying the bad examples that poison our society and children, starting in earliest infancy."

In only a few months, the World March has gained the support of thousands of people and inspired an enormous number of initiatives. It

GERMANY After the ceremonies in commemoration of the 20th anniversary of the fall of the Berlin wall, Silo was the guest of honor at the summit.

Silo denounced the irresponsible interests of the world's nuclear powers and the madness of violent groups, in a world threatened by the high probability of conflicts and nuclear accidents, by the arms race and the violent military occupation of territories.

He also insisted on the necessity to awake a global awareness of peace and disarmament and to create a new sensibility that rejects not only physical violence, but all forms of economic, racial, psychological and gender violence. He cited some recent examples that show that this transformation is possible thanks to exemplary social actions.

When Mairead **Corrigan Maguire** presented the "Charter for a World Without Violence", Silo promised, in the name of the Humanist Movement and its affiliated organizations, to be emissaries for the Charter and to disseminate it widely during the World March, an unprecedented social mobilization that since October 2nd and for three months is crossing a hundred countries in six continents.

The World March will end on January 2nd 2010 with a great concentration in Punta de Vacas, Argentina, at the foot of Mount Aconcagua, which saw the thinker's first public speech 40 years ago.

Since then, without interruption, *Silo* has publicly denounced, in numerous meetings, conferences, seminars and public events the situation of escalating violence in the world and the need for active nonviolence. The Humanist Movement was born

from his thought and teaching and has implemented the methodology of active nonviolence in social, cultural and political field, through many social based organizations worldwide.

He has faced the many aspects of human life and the process of mankind, close to an unprecedented turn, in several writings in various styles: poetic prose, descriptive psychology, stories, letters, historiological discussions, studies on myths (http://www.silo.net). Silo has also received public recognition such as the honorary distinction of the Russian Academy of Sciences.

→ "calls on all people to join forces and to take into their own hands the responsibility to change our world, overcoming personal violence and supporting the growth of this positive influence in their immediate environment."

He said about the methodology of nonviolence that "they continue denigrating nonviolent action, arguing that beyond making declarations nothing more can be done in the face of the "real" powers that determine world situations". He illustrated how some exemplary social action had produced great progress. Among them, he cited what happened in the Czech Republic where, after years of protests, we obtained the postponement of the signing of the treaty and then its final suspension after Obama's inauguration.

Silo said: "Only such exemplary social action has the ability to bury the existing social structures and to produce a radical change in our world." And he added: "The true strength of this impulse is born in the simple act of one who, out of conscience, joins a dignified cause and shares it with others".

BELGIUM

Brussels and Ypres showed their warmth and joy at the arrival of the Base Team. Besides the welcome by the authorities, there were ceremonies and festive events.

FRANCE

Paris became a party at the rhythm of nonviolence, with a large participation of organizations and hundreds of supporters.

FRENCH ROUTE

The "flame of Hiroshima" toured the nation from Paris to Perpignan, crossing the towns of Saintes, Saint-Pierre d'Oléron, Bordeaux, Agen, Cahors, Toulouse and Carcassonne from November 6th to 12th.





IRELAND

Shannon Airport, where the U.S. warplanes land, became a multicolored island of peace, coinciding with the vigil of November 8th that peace groups have been organizing since 1991.



GERMANY

The march passed twice through Berlin, for the events on November 7th and for the assistance to the Tenth Summit of Nobel Peace Laureates, on November 11th.



SWITZERLAND

The WM is promoting the "yes" to the November 29 vote to ban arms sales abroad; the Mayor of Geneva, Rémy Pagani, denounced it as an hypocrisy of the country.
